**THE SERIES:** The Rattlers and Gladiators have rolled the dice 10 times, with Arizona's snake eyes getting the best eight times, including a current four-game win streak. The two teams tangled earlier this season, when the Rattlers recorded their first victory in 2007 with a 68-41 triumph over the Gladiators at the U.S. Airways Center. Sunday's match-up marks the first game in the series played at the Orleans Arena as Las Vegas previously called UNLV's Thomas and Mack Center home. The series dates back to the 2002 season, when the Gladiators were based in New Jersey.



**RATTLERS IN REVIEW:**

The Rattlers remain in the playoff hunt, despite the team's 3-10 record. The team got off to a quick start last week before falling to the defending ArenaBowl champion Chicago Rush. Arizona will look to rebound against a Gladiators team that has fallen four consecutive times to the Rattlers. Two of Arizona's three wins in 2007 have come against division foes, including a 68-41 win against Las Vegas in Week 4.

**NEXT GAME:** A big Monday Night Football showdown awaits the Rattlers as division rival Los Angeles visits the Snake Pit on June 11. Arizona will attempt to avenge a Week 6 loss at Los Angeles in front of a nationally-televised audience on *ESPN2*. Though the Rattlers hold a 10-7 all-time series advantage against the Avengers, Los Angeles has won four of the last five meetings.

## **Rookie Record**

Though injury kept **TRANDON HARVEY** out of action last week vs. Chicago, the Rattlers first-year receiver is just 326 yards away from setting a new AFL rookie receiving record, currently held by Freddie Solomon (Tampa Bay, 2003). Harvey's made a big impact in his first Arena Football season as the former Washington State Cougar leads the Rattlers in receiving this season with 1,226 yards, which ranks eighth in the league and first among all rookies. Harvey's 27 touchdowns are tied for eighth in the league this season and his 84 receptions rank 20<sup>th</sup> – both of which lead all Rattlers receivers this season.

## **A Familiar Foe**

The Gladiators featured a familiar face to NFL fans the last time Arizona and Las Vegas met with former Arizona Cardinal Shaun King under center. This time around the Rattlers will face a familiar foe in quarterback **NICK ROLOVICH**, who began his 2007 season in Arizona. Rolovich participated in Rattlers training camp each of the past two seasons. In 2006 he began camp with Arizona prior to suffering a season-ending injury. Rolovich was once again in Arizona to begin the 2007 season, but lost out to Ryan Dinwiddie in a three-way competition (Todd Mortensen) for the back-up role to **SHERDRICK BONNER**. Since being signed by the Gladiators, Rolovich – who made his first start for Las Vegas last week – has connected on 36 of his 57 passing attempts, throwing for 413 yards and nine touchdowns – good for a quarterback rating of 124.4.

## **Atypical Record for Rattlers**

With a 3-10 record and three games remaining the Rattlers are headed for just their second season with a losing record in the franchise's 16-year history. The last time Arizona completed a regular season with a sub-.500 record was 1992 (4-6) – the Rattlers first season in existence.

## Still Alive and Kickin'

At 3-10 with three games to go in the 2007 season, the Rattlers remain in the postseason hunt. In fact, competition in the Arena Football League is so tight this season that heading into Week 14 all 19 AFL teams currently find themselves in the chase for a chance at the championship and a trip to New Orleans.

## New Digs

Sunday will mark Arizona's first game in the Orleans Arena. The Gladiators previously played at UNLV's Thomas and Mack Center on the Las Vegas school's campus. The relatively new facility (opened in 2003) has a league-low capacity of 9,008. The \$85 million dollar arena was part of a \$140,000,000 property expansion at the Orleans Hotel and Casino and also serves as home ice for the ECHL's Las Vegas Wranglers.

## Quality Quarterback

Rattlers quarterback **SHERDRICK BONNER** has boosted himself back among the league's elite passers. Bonner's 3,793 passing yards ranks second in the league this season behind Utah's **JOE GERMAINE** (4,332). Bonner's 78 touchdown passes rank third overall (Germaine, 92) and his 297 completions place fifth (Germaine, 359).

## Back in the Day...

Las Vegas holds special memories for Rattlers receiver **RANDY GATEWOOD** as the two-time Ironman of the Year once ran routes for the UNLV Runnin' Rebels. A two-year letterman at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, Gatewood was an All-American honorable mention and first-team All-Conference selection for his senior season. He finished second in NCAA Division I in receptions (88) and fifth in yards (1,203) in 1995. During his junior season, Gatewood set an NCAA single-game record with 23 receptions for 363 yards vs. Nevada.

## Defensive keystones

**KEYUO CRAVER** continues to shine in his first Arena Football season. Craver's 87.0 combined tackles are tied for third overall in the league this season and top among all AFL rookies – 22 ahead of second place among rookies, Nashville's **LIAM EZEKIEL**. Craver also leads all league rookies in solo tackles (77) and his four forced fumbles are tied for sixth overall (five players tied with 5) and first among rookies. He also has nine passes defensed this season, which ranks second among all first-year players. Also making his mark on the defensive side of the ball is fellow first-year starter **GRANT STEEN**. The linebacker is tied for third among rookies in interceptions with three.

## Coaches Corner

### GENE NUDO

Rattlers Head Coach: 2<sup>nd</sup> Season  
Regular Season: 11-18 (.379)  
Postseason: 1-1 (.500)

Gene Nudo, the AFL's only three-time Executive of the Year, is celebrating his 13th season with the Arizona Rattlers and second as the team's head coach. In his first year at the helm, Nudo led the Rattlers to their 13th playoff appearance in franchise history. He guided the Rattlers to the American Conference Semifinal after a Wild Card Round playoff victory over the Utah Blaze.

Nudo, who joined the Rattlers as an assistant head coach in 1995 after serving as the Arena Football League's Vice President of Football Operations, became the team's Vice President of Administration the following season. Nudo has also served as the team's Vice President of Operations for eight seasons before becoming general manager in 2004.

While overseeing day-to-day football operations, Nudo helped the Rattlers earn five consecutive commissioner awards for the AFL's "Best Organization" (1996-2000), while earning an unprecedented three "Executive of the Year" awards (1997, 1999, 2000). Formerly a member of the AFL Board of Directors Executive Committee, Nudo has also served as the chairman of the AFL's Rules and Competition Committee and as a member of the league's Labor Relations Committee. Nudo is currently the chairman of the rules and competition subcommittee. He was instrumental in helping the AFL and its players enter into an interim collective bargaining agreement in 2000.

Nudo began his coaching career in 1981 as head coach of the River Grove Cowboys of Chicago's Metropolitan Football League. As a head coach, he won five championships in six seasons, including the 1984 AFA Semi-Professional National Championship in Mobile, Ala. He would later lead Chicago's Driscoll Catholic High School to an undefeated 1991 Illinois State High School Championship.

### Danton Barto

Gladiators Head Coach: 1<sup>st</sup> Season  
Regular Season: 2-10 (.167)

Barto spent the last five seasons as the Head Coach of the Memphis Xplorers of af2. His career regular season record entering the season stands at 49-35 and 4-2 in the postseason. He is the winningest coach in af2 over the last three seasons. He was named the af2 Coach of the Year in 2005 as he led the Xplorers to their best season in franchise history; a 13-3 regular season mark, a Midwest Division title and the 2005 ArenaCup Championship.

In 2004, Memphis won ten games and earned their first trip to the playoffs, before falling to the eventual champion Florida Firecats on a last second field goal miss. Barto was promoted from defensive coordinator to the head coach position prior to the 2002 season and won his first three games in what turned out to be a 5-11 season. Coach Barto is still considered a University of Memphis legend; he played for the Tigers from 1990-1993. He currently is the only player to be named to the All-American team three different years. He is still ranked number one in career tackles for the University of Memphis with 473. Coach Barto also enjoyed a 5-year professional career in the CFL and AFL leagues. In the CFL, he played for the Shreveport Pirates, Memphis Mad Dogs, Hamilton Tiger-Cats and the Ottawa Rough Riders. In the AFL, he played for the Connecticut Coyotes in 1996.

Coach Barto currently resides with his wife Rachel and his 9-year-old son Will in Collierville, TN. He is a native of Niceville, FL.

## **Recap: WEEK 13**

*Arizona Rattlers vs. Chicago Rush*

*May 26, 2007 Attendance: 9,663*

### **RUSH RALLY PAST RATTLERS, 53-47**

**PHOENIX** – In a game where both teams were without their star wideouts it was the Chicago Rush which won the battle of attrition, topping the Arizona Rattlers 53-47 Saturday night in front of 9,663 at the U.S. Airways Center.

Chicago (9-3) came into town on a two-game losing streak, having lost Bobby Sippio to injury prior to the skid. Sippio was once again on the shelf for the defending ArenaBowl champs and his absence showed early as the Rattlers (3-10) held the Rush on downs on Chicago's first drive.

The defensive stand for Arizona came in between a pair of touchdowns by Jeremiah Pope, who took control of the Rattlers receiving reigns with leading wideout Trandon Harvey inactive with a sprained ankle.

Pope's production propelled the Rattlers to an early 14-0 lead and showed that the second-year receiver has bounced back from his own injury earlier in the season.

"That's my job, my duty, to come in here and do what I can do," Pope said. "I have guys around me that can spread the field and get open also. I'm not a rookie anymore. It's expected from the coaches and the other players that I step up every game. That's my part and I try to play my part and I just try to play my best and play my heart out."

The defensive winds would quickly change in Chicago's favor as Pope's second score with 8:16 remaining in the first quarter were Arizona's last points of the first half. The Rush responded to the Rattlers early advantage with 24 unanswered points on a Dan Frantz 20-yard field goal and three consecutive Matt D'Orazio touchdown passes to close out the half.

Chicago also put the clamps on Arizona's offense after its early output, stopping the Rattlers once on downs and forcing Clay Rush to unsuccessfully attempt a pair of 62-yard field goals.

The Rush seemed poised to put the game out of reach as they prepared to receive the opening kick of the second half holding a 10-point lead. Arizona had other plans in mind as Rush punched a perfect on-side kick which the Rattlers recovered – the kicker's first such since being signed by Arizona.

The Rattlers responded to the momentum shift with a quick-strike, 3-play drive – capped by a 17-yard Sherdrick Bonner to Curtis Fagan touchdown connection – that closed Chicago's lead to 24-21.

The Rattlers would get no closer, however, as the two teams swapped scores the remainder of the game with Chicago's lead climbing to six points on a successful two-point conversion and a failed Arizona extra point and two-point conversion. The Rattlers attempted to break the tit-for-tat scoring pattern down the stretch, but were unsuccessful on a trio of on-side kick attempts.

"It just came down to one drive where they stopped us and from there it was going back and forth," Pope said. "We made a late run, but we fought hard. You could say they didn't have Bobby Sippio, but they are still a good team without him. We fought hard and it came down to one play and they got it."

Pope's 108 yards receiving and three touchdowns earned him Offensive Player of the Game honors. Fagan added 88 yards and a score for a depleted Rattlers receiving core which also suffered an injury to Atnaf Harris that limited the wideout to just six yards on one catch.

Bonner completed 22 of his 34 pass attempts for 245 yards and four touchdowns. His Chicago counterpart Matt D'Orazio completed 27 of his 37 attempts for 229 yards and six scores. Leading the Rush was wide receiver Rob Mager, who caught nine balls for 118 yards a pair of touchdowns.

Chicago's Dennison Robinson was named the ADT Defensive Player of the game as he ranked second on the Rush in tackles with four and intercepted Bonner late in the third quarter. DeJuan Alfonzo earned the game's Ironman distinction with 58 receiving yards and three touchdowns on offense paired with 2.5 tackles and a pass defended.
